The vision conveys IDRiM's identity and the contribu-

The vision statement emphasizes that we are interested in the policy relevance of our work. It also acknowledges that we have been and want to continue to be leaders in making a science out of policy implementation. These three aspects—research, policy, and implementation—bring together our entire membership for an overall common purpose. The Society looks forward to making this vision a reality and thereby making this a safer and more sustainable world.

▶ Lifetime Outstanding Service Award







AFPCNT and IDRIM Society have started this webinar as an International initiative of the Network of Networks for Risk Based Decision Making (N2RBDM), together with international partner organizations from the scientific and civil society world, sharing the objective to support the implementation of the Sendai Framework for Action through the skills and daily commitment of their members, be they practitioners or academics. In our studies, research, and work, we all believe in and act in particular for better and more widespread Risk-Based Decision Making (RBDM) practical environments, methods, and tools, one of the important SFA objectives. The first webinar was held on 24 April 2024. We invited two experts (one practi-

tioner, one scientist) to share their experiences and sparked debate between the experts and the audiences, paving a unique wasy of interaction and dissemination of knowledge between the participants. The second webinar was held on 20 May 2024, as a side event of the III Inter-American Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction and Adaptation to Climate Change.

Achivements

The IDRiM Event Organizing Committee has had a productive year from 2023 to 2024. The committee has devoted efforts to advance the discourse and practice of integrated disaster risk management through a variety of inclusive and engaging events, including IDRiM Café, IDRiM Lectures, IDRiM Webinars, and the IDRiM YSS Awardees Presentation.

In the past year, we have successfully organized six IDRiM Café events, with two additional sessions currently in preparation for later in 2024. The topics addressed in these cafés were both varied and highly relevant, covering cutting-edge issues within the field. In addition, the IDRiM lecture series this year featured three distinguished speakers: Prof. Ortwin Renn from Germany, Prof. Andrew Collins from the UK, and Prof. Bijay Anand Misra from India. These lectures covered a broad spectrum of topics, from risk governance to human vulnerability, to how to coping with a world with increasing uncertainty and complexity. These lectures have provided attendees with deep insights and have stimulated significant discussions within the community. Furthermore, the IDRiM webinar series, which newly started in 2024, is an international initiative aimed at fostering a network for risk-based decision making. The committee has conducted two webinars this year, which facilitated international collaboration and shared knowledge on critical topics in disaster risk management. Lastly, this year' IDRiM conference have innovatively adopted a combination of online and offline methods to organize the Young Scientisy Session in order to increase the participation of young scholars. Accordingly, presentations by YSS Awardees of two types of awards and two types of wards were also successfully organized.

Our committee members have held regular monthly meetings to select themes, identify speakers, and coordinate with invited guests. These gatherings have been instrumental in ensuring the smooth execution of our events. Through these efforts, we have successfully involved a diverse range of participants, including distinguished scholars, early-career researchers, decision-makers, and community representatives. Over the year, the committee has engaged more than thousands participants in the series events.

The diverse range of activities organized by the IDRiM Event Organizing Committee has provided a vital platform for stakeholders from various sectors, fields and age groups to engage in meaningful risk communication. By bridging gaps between different communities and promoting interdisciplinary dialogue, our efforts have facilitated more effective and inclusive risk communication. We look forward to continuing our work in the coming year to enhance the understanding and management of disaster risks through innovative, inclusive, and impactful events.

Membership Committee



Period 10.2023 - 08. 2024

In addition to the routine function of processing ongoing membership applications and responding to the requests from the IDRiM Board, the Membership Committee regained and maintained its monthly meeting since October 2023 after a period of inaction. The main focuses since have been:

- Analysis of the current state of the IDRiM Society membership and identify priorities for an action plan
- Criteria and procedure for the Honorary Membership, both internal and external.
- Supporting and coordinating the development of the IDRiM Regional Chapters
- · Initiating the development of an 'Young Scientist/Student Forum (YSF)'
- · Expansion of the Membership Committee

► IDRiM Membership analysis

In order to identify the priorities for the MC action plan, Professor Jiang Xinyu led and carried out a detailed overview and analysis of the current state of the IDRIM Scoetiy Membership (a result reporting PPT is available). While there has been a steady growth of the membership since the IDRIM Society establishment, we have seen notable fluctuations of the membership over the years. Thus, actions and measures that can support the maintenance of the existing membership are identified as an equally important priority as the expansion of the membership. The MC has looked into a wide range of factors based on the result of the membership analysis, including the fee structure, the rewards and benefits/attraction for being a IDRIM member, the diversity of the IDRIM memberships, and possible measures/actions to motivate more active participation of the members, especially young members.



Developed and finalized criteria and procedure for IDRIM Honorary Membership

After several rounds of discussion among the MC members as well as consultation with the IDRiM BoD members, the Criteria and Procedure for IDRiM Honorary Membership (HM) was submitted to and approved by the BoD meeting in March 2024. And the first group of the HM recipients, both internal and external, have been granted and accepted.

Coordinating the development of the IDRiM Regional Chapter-India

It has been agreed by the BoD as a strategic direction to enlarge the global standing of the IDRiM Society through the development of IDRM regional chapters. As a pilot, Professor Misra and colleagues have made major efforts to secure and prepare all the necessary conditions for initiating the IDRiM Regional Chapter – India. The proposal was in principle agreed by the BoD in March 2024, followed by coordination meetings discussing the possible operational structure including the membership relations. This task will continue with the further development of the regional chapters.

Initiating and development of a Young Scientist/Student Forum (YSF)

As a key effort to motivate more active involvement of young IDRiM members, the MC has worked closely with the Young Scientist Committee to initiate and promote a Young Scientist/Student Forum (YSF), in addition to the already existing young scientist session at the annual meeting; award; and awardee lectures. The idea of YSF is to promote continuous engagement of motivated members to share career/research development needs and challenges, enhancing network and collaboration. A special session will be organized at the IDRiM 2024 Conference to solicit interests and feedback, as well as initial volunteers to form a group that is keen to initiate a YSF.



► Change of the Membership Committee

Professor Adam Rose resigned from the MC. Professor Jiang Xinyu (since October 2023) and Professor Madhumita Chatterji (sinch April 2024) have joined the MC.

Reveiw **Charter** and Bylaws Committee



WHAT WE DO

1. Purpose:

To proactively monitor the IDRiM Charter and Bylaws so that these are responsive to new demands for developments in Integrated Disaster Risk Management as reflected within the Society.

2. Activities:

The past year involved ongoing iterative review of the Charter and Bylaws in coordination with the IDRiM Board of Directors and corresponding activities of the other IDRiM committees. The committee focussed on developing one appropriate addition to the IDRiM Charter that will guide the establishment of regional chapters. Members of the committee attended all IDRiM meetings during this period during which the establishment of regional chapters were discussed. This included additional follow up discussions with IDRiM members in India in respect of a specific proposal from that region brought to IDRiM for the establishment of a South Asia Chapter of IDRiM. In response to an agreement by the IDRiM Board of Directors to accept in principle the establishment of the chapter secretariate in India, the Charter and Bylaws Committee developed an additional article for insertion in the IDRIM Charter. This is for general application to all regional chapters.

3. Outcomes:

The final revision for Article 14 of the IDRIM Charter was made on 30th July, 2024 as follows: Article 14 (Regional Chapters)

- 1. The Board of Directors may approve the establishment of Regional Chapters of the IDRiM Society. A region must be more than one country.
- 2. A Regional Chapter exists to provide additional forums that expand the implementation of IDRiM objectives and activities at a regional and local level whilst creating new opportunities through the IDRiM regional membership. It should give importance to the expansion of IDRiM into different regions, create opportunities in those regions for young and professional members and help strengthen the institutions engaging IDRiM.
- 3. IDRiM requires its Regional Chapters to have an advisory board and regional secretariate that reports to the Board of Directors of IDRiM as need be, this being not less than once each year. Regional secretariates will be a centre of disaster management committed to furthering IDRiM aims, objectives and activities. The office of the regional secretariate must rotate around institutions within the region. The rotation will usually be on a three yearly basis or as agreed between the advisory board of the regional chapter and the Board of Directors of IDRiM.
- 4. Regional Chapters of IDRiM appoint a chairperson and sub-group that represents the regional chapter and is approved by the regional chapter and the Board of Directors of IDRiM. The Chairperson will be the director of the institution responsible for the Secretariate and the activities of the Regional Chapter, or their institutional designate.
- 5. Members of IDRiM can also be members of a Regional Chapter should one exist in their region. The Chairperson and sub-group that represent the Regional Chapters will be members of the global IDRiM Society. Members of Regional Chapters must be encouraged to also become members of the global IDRiM Society.
- 6. Regional Chapters will be self-financed. The Regional Chapter Secretariate can be sponsored by corporate, government or third sector finance with the approval of the Board of Directors of IDRiM. To be self-financed, the Regional Chapter Secretariate, with the approval of its advisory board and IDRiM can enrol willing and eligible members with a fee.

4. As a next step:

it is recommended by the Committee that this approved Article 14 be inserted into the IDRiM Charter with immediate effect following the next Board of Directors Annual General Meeting.





YSS Committee

▶ Introduction

Young scientists are a distinctive group within academia, known for their innovative ideas and research that either supports or challenges existing worldviews. Regrettably, the majority of these researchers leave academia within three years of completing their programs, causing many of their significant insights and studies to remain unexplored.


The Young Scientists Session (YSS) is a pivotal feature of each IDRiM conference. It offers young academics and practitioners a crucial platform to present their work to a broader audience. This year's conference, hosted by the Unidad Nacional para la Gestión del Riesgo de Desastres (UNGRD) in Colombia, has adjusted the presentation format. Presentations have been extended from the previous 7 and 10 minutes at IDRiM 2022 and 2023 respectively to 15 minutes, including a Q&A session. This modification aligns with last year's format, ensuring that both young and senior researchers are evaluated by the same standards.

IDRiM2024 - Maintaining Growth

For this year's IDRiM conference, we have provisionally recognized 52 presentations/posters as part of the YSS. As demonstrated in the figure below, this represents a 8.3 percent increase from 2022, and a significant 79.3 percent increase from 2021. However, it reflects a 17.5 percent decrease from 2023. It's important to note that the conferences hosted by IDRiM in India historically attracted a significant influx of young researchers. Since the COVID-19 pandemic, there has been a general uptrend in the participation of young researchers at IDRiM conferences. However, it is worth noting the notable absence of young scientists based in North America and Oceania during this year's conference.

Early in the planning of this year's conference, we decided to continue using the format from IDRiM 2023 held in India, allowing young researchers to present alongside more experienced colleagues. Notably, this is the second IDRiM conference to employ a hybrid format. As observed during the last conference, while it poses certain challenges, it also expands opportunities for young researchers who might not be able to travel to Colombia by allowing them to present their research remotely.

Due to the high number of abstracts received (including those for the YSS), for the first time, we have organized a special online session exclusively for YSS participants who were not included in the main conference sessions. This session is scheduled for Monday, 19th August and will feature 7 YSS presentations.





Additionally, this year, the YSS will include a judging committee to address the imbalance in voter numbers and prevent YSS participants from voting for their own presentations, a practice observed in the last few years.



YSS Award Presentations

In recent years, as part of expanding the YSS format, the winners of the YSS session are now awarded the opportunity to fully present their research in a webinar. As a result, two sets of webinars took place on Monday, December 12th, and Wednesday, December 20th, 2023. During these sessions, the top three awardees from both the in-person and online categories at the 2023 IDRiM conference delivered their presentations. Additionally, recordings of four out of the six presentations are now available for viewing on the IDRiM YouTube channel.

Unfortunately, viewership for these webinars declined significantly last year, likely due to the timing of the events during the Christmas/holiday season. The YSS committee extends heartfelt thanks to the speakers for their participation and for allowing IDRIM to share their presentations on the society's YouTube channel and website.

To better accommodate our audience, we have decided to schedule the fourth set of YSS awardee events in either April or May 2025, shifting away from the December slot which experienced low engagement last year. Further details about these events will be provided closer to the dates.



Development of the IDRiM Young Scientist Forum (YSF)

Since early 2024, the YSS committee has collaborated with the Membership Committee to develop the IDRiM Young Scientist Forum (YSF). The goal of the YSF is to provide young researchers worldwide with a safe space to discuss ideas and present new research among their peers. The concept for the forum was initiated by Prof. Bijay Anand Misra and Prof. Gioyan Han from the Membership Committee and further developed with the expertise of Dr. Mark Ashley Parry, who co-created a similar initiative for the United Kingdom Alliance for Disaster Research (UKADR). The forum will be formally announced at the IDRiM 2024 conference in Cartagena, Colombia, with a foundational paper being developed based on the thoughts and feelings of young researchers at the conference.



Closing Remarks

I'd like to extend my heartfelt thanks to the UNGRD team, especially Jeisson, Maria Camila, and Mauricio, for their efforts in organizing this year's conference. Their teamwork and dedication have made the planning process smooth and a dream come true.
